

## **Pension Application for Isaac Daniels or Danielson**

On this sixteenth day of April in the year 1863—personally appeared before me the subscriber a Notary Public—in and for the City and County aforesaid duly commissioned and sworn according to law, Isaac Daniels a resident of the aforesaid City County and State aged one hundred and two years, who being first buy me duly sworn according to law and made the following declaration to enable him to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress approved June 7<sup>th</sup> 1832, (viz).

That he the said Isaac Daniels was regularly mustered into the service of the United States to serve in the Continental Army, that he was mustered as aforesaid at the town of Bedford in WestChester County in the State aforesaid in the spring of 1776 and served out the most of two terms and was honorably discharged at the expiration of five years, to wit, in the spring of 1781.

That he served as a private under various officers the names of two, he now only remembers (viz) Col. Hobby and Captain Sealy—that he was at the battle of White Plains and his service was for most of his time in the State of New York and the residue in the State of Connecticut.

That by some mistake his name was placed on the Rolls as Danielson to which name he always answered—the regiment to which he was attached served on Long Island in New York City, West Chester and in the Country North towards Albany.

That his messmates were Edward Cannoly or Kennedy, Henry Lake and others—that he has no documentary evidence to establish his service. That he knows of no person now living who can testify to the same and that he relies upon the proof hereunto annexed and he prays that such pension may be granted him as proof and merits of his care will warrant.

That this is the first application and the only one he has ever made for a pension, and that the reason why he has not before applied is as stated herein that he was unable to find witnesses to his services in the war of the Revolution.

This deponent further saith that he was born May 20<sup>th</sup> 1760 as appears by the [rest cut off] to establish his service. That he knows of no person now living who can testify to the same and that he relies upon the proof hereunto annexed and he prays that such pension may be granted him as the proof and he prays that such pension may be granted him as the proof and merits of his case will warrant.

That this is the first application and the only one he has ever made for a pension and the only one he has ever made for a pension, and that the reason why he has not before applied is as stated herein.

That he was unable to find witnesses to his services in the war of the Revolution.

This deponent further saith that he was born May 20<sup>th</sup> 1760, as appears by the record in the family bible. And further he saith not. (Signed with his mark) Isaac Daniels
