

### **Pension Application for Abraham Deyo or Duyo**

W.16236 (Widow: Bridget) Married October 21, 1779 in New Paltz. Abraham died February 3, 1834.

Letter in folder dated September 3, 1931, written in response to an inquiry.

You are advised that it appears from the papers in the Revolutionary War pension claim, W.16236, that Abraham Deyo was born in 1759, in New Paltz, Ulster County, New York. His age was recorded on the records of the Dutch Reformed Church of New Paltz.

While residing in New Paltz, New York, he enlisted and served as a private with the New York Troops as follows: from sometime in 1776, exact date not shown, one month under Lieutenant Peter Hasbrouck and Colonel Hasbrouck; and one month and fifteen days in Captain Johannis Hardenbergh's Company, Colonel Jacob Hoornbeck's Regiment, marched to Stillwater but was not in the battle at that place being stationed about a half mile in the rear; after the battle assisted in conducting the prisoners, captured at that engagement, to Albany; from sometime in 1778, one month in Captain Moses Cantine's Company, Colonel Paulding's Regiment; in 1779, three tours of one month each in the months of July, September and November, under Lieutenant Peter Hasbrouck and Colonel Paulding; in 1780, two tours of one month each, in the months of July and September, under the last above named officers.

He was allowed pension on his application executed October 8, 1833, while residing in New Paltz, New York.

He died February 3, 1834, in New Paltz, New York.

The soldier married October 21, 1799, in New Paltz, New York, Bridget Freer or Friar.

Soldier's widow, Bridget, was allowed pension on her application executed June 21, 1837, at which time she was aged seventy-seven years and resided in New Paltz, New York.

There is no reference to children.

In 1838, one Abraham A. Deyo was a judge of the county court of Ulster County, New York, no relationship to soldier shown.
