

### **Bounty Land Information for John L. Hardenberg**

Nothing much is in the folder except a letter dated September 29, 1937, written in response to an inquiry.

Reference is made to your letter in which you request information relative to Thomas Buss who served as surgeon of a ship during the Revolution;, Johannes (Or John A.) Hardenburgh who served as a captain from Ulster County, New York, also as lieutenant in another regiment, land Noah LeFevre who served as sergeant from Orange County, same state.

There are no claims for pension or bounty land on file based upon service in the Revolution of either Thomas Budd or Noah LeFebre, both surnames searched under all spellings. Such claims are the source of data furnished by this office in regard to Revolutionary War soldiers. The record has been found of only one John Hardenberg whose middle initial was L. instead of A. His record is furnished herein as it may prove of interest to you in your research.

The records of this office show that Warrant No. 986, for two hundred acres of bounty land, was issued April 9, 1791, on account of the services of John L. Hardenberg, Lieutenant in the New York Line, War of the Revolution.

This office has no further information relative to this officer because of the destruction of the papers in such early claims when the War Office was burned in November, 1800.
