

Pension Application for Thomas Jewett

In chancery, before the Vice Chancellor of the 5th Circuit on this fourteenth day of August 1832 personally appeared in open court before the Vice Chancellor of the 5th Circuit in the court of Chancery for Circuit now sitting, Thomas Jewett a resident of said circuit & state, aged seventy four years, who being first duly sworn according to law, doth on his oath make the following declaration, in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress, passed June 7, 1832.

That he entered the service of the United States under the following named officers, and served as herein stated:

That he was born in Canterbury Con in April 1758. Have no record of age—resided at Canterbury when he entered service—Since war at Canterbury & now Rome Oneida Co., N.Y. That about August 1776 went in militia under Capt. Sherabiah Butts in Col. Douglass Regt and marched to Westchester in State of New York and the service was performed there and at White Plains about three months.

In November 1776 went again in the same company & same Regt and served at South Kingstown, Rhode Island about two months.

That about February 1777 he enlisted in Capt Kinnes Company, Maj. Ripleys command for two months and marched to Providence and Bristol and served s'd two months.

That about 1st September 1777 was drafted for two months and went in Capt Daniel Clarks Co'y, Col. Sattimores Regt and marched to the State of N. York & was present when Burgoyne was taken having served two months.

In Nov. 1779 enlisted for four months in Capt Joseph Durkees Col, Col. Wells Regt Con Troops & marched to N. [Sundio?] Old Mills &c and served said term of four months in the whole 13 months refers to annexed affidavits.

He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension or annuity except the present, and declares that his name is not on the pension roll of the agency of any state. (Signed) Thomas Jewett
