

Pension Application for Christopher Koenig

On this second day of October 1832, personally appeared in open court before the Judges of the Court of Common Pleas in the County of Schoharie, now sitting, Christopher Koenig of the town of Cobelskill in the county of Schoharie aged 71 years who being first duly sworn according to law, doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed June 7th 1832.

That he entered the service of the United States under the following named officers and served as herein stated that he the said Christopher Koenig enlisted in Schoharie for the term of nine months, on the first of April 1778 in the company of Rangers commanded by Captain John Dietz in the Regiment commanded by Colonel Peter Vrooman in the Militia in the Line of the State of New York; on the [?] Continental Establishment, that he served in said corps, his term of enlistment out faithfully, until the first January 1779 that he was honorably discharged from the service in Schoharie in the State of New York, by Captain John Dietz, by word that he the said Christopher Koenig enlisted again in Schoharie for the term of seven months on the first of May 1780 in the company commanded by Captain Harper in the regiment commanded by Colonel Peter Vrooman; that he served part of the time in Schoharie from thence he marched under the command of Captain Harper and Major Wilsey by word to Harkimer now the county of Harkimer [Herkimer], and at the expiration of the seven months service—he was in that place honorably discharged from the service in the State of New York, by Major Wilsey by word.

That he was born at Cobelskill and lived in Cobleskill ever since the American revolution, that he hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension or annuity and declares that his name is not on the pension roll of the agency of any state. (Signed with his mark) Christopher Koenig
