

### **Pension Application for Francis Monty**

Disability

Issued Jan. 22, 1790 to Benjamin Mooers, assignee. No papers.

The Revolutionary War records of this office show that Francis Monty was commissioned Lieutenant, November 25, 1775, in Colonel J. Livingston's regiment, and while serving in line of duty in Rhode Island in 1778, he received a must ball wound in his left thigh. He left the service January 1, 1781.

The records show that Warrant #1393, for two hundred acres of bounty land, was issued January 22, 1790, to Benjamin Mooers, assignee, Continental Line, War of the Revolution.

On account of disability resulting from injuries incurred during his service in the Revolution, Francis Monty was pensioned. He was transferred from the Pennsylvania Agency September 4, 1795, to the New York Agency, residence shown, Lake Champlain. He died February 8, 1809.

This office has no statements made by the applicant for pension and bounty land, because of the destruction of papers in such early applications when the War Office was burned in 1800, therefore, no further data relative to Lieutenant Francis Monty.
