

### **Pension Application for John Moore**

On this 15<sup>th</sup> day of September 1826 before me the subscriber, a Justice of the Peace for said County personally appeared John Moore 3d who on his oath declares that he is the same person who formerly belonged to the Company commanded by Captain Leonard Blaker in the first New York Regiment in the service of the United States--

That his name was placed on the Pension Roll of the State of New York from whence he has removed—That he now resides in the State of Ohio where he intends to remain, and wishes his Pension to be payable at Pittsburg in future—and that his reasons for removing to the State of Ohio were the enjoyment of the society & assistance of his children settled in said State of Ohio. (Signed with his Mark) John Moore 3d

Sworn & subscribed to before me, the day & year aforesaid. Alpheus C. Russell

Letter in folder, undated, written in response to an inquiry.

You are advised that it appears from the papers in the Revolutionary War pension claim, S.40168, that John Moore or More enlisted in Schenectady, New York, in June, 1777, and served as a private in Captain Leonard Bleeker's Company, Colonel Gansevort's New York Regiment, was transferred to Colonel Goose VanSchaick's 1<sup>st</sup> New York regiment, and was discharged in June, 1785. He was in the battles of Fort Stanwix and the capture of Cornwallis at Yorktown.

He was allowed pension on his application executed May 26, 1818, at which time he was living in Geauga County, Ohio, and was aged about sixty-four years.

In 1826 the soldier stated that he was living in Ohio to enjoy the society and assistance of his children who had settled there, but he did not give the names of any of his children.

One Isaac More testified in the case in [1826?] in Geauga County, Ohio, no relationship shown.
