

Pension Application for Timothy Munger

W.17190 (Widow: Naomi) Married March 25, 1784. Timothy died November 8, 1825.
State of New York
County of Saratoga SS.

On this tenth day of October A.D. 1838, personally appeared before me, George G. Scott a Judge of the Court of Common Pleas in and for the County of Saratoga aforesaid, Naomi Munger a resident in Stillwater in the County of Saratoga and State of New York aged seventy-nine years, who being duly sworn according to law, doth, on her oath, make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the provision made by the Act of Congress passed July 7, 1828 entitled "An act granting half pay and pension to certain widows": That she is the widow of Timothy Munger who as a private in the Army of the Revolution.

That according to the best of her knowledge information and belief, her husband the said Timothy, resided in Stillwater in the County of Albany (now Saratoga) in the State of New York. She believes that McKinstry commanded as Major or Colonel.

In 1781 or 2 about the 1st of March when Timothy Munger her said husband deceased, resided in Stillwater aforesaid (at Stillwater aforesaid or Saratoga) enlisted and entered into the service of the United States. For Nine months, and served as a private under the aforesaid officers, and served at Saratoga during the full period of his engagement, which was nine months. She has no documentary evidence of the Revolutionary services of her husband the said Timothy Munger deceased but relies on the proof hereto annexed and the records or rolls of the War department of the United States.

She further declares that she was married to the said Timothy Munger deceased, in the year seventeen hundred and eighty four; on the twenty-fifth day of March; by the Reverend Mr. Powers, who then & for many years, subsequent thereto, was Pastor of a Church in the said town of Stillwater and who is now dead.

That her husband the aforesaid Timothy Munger died on the Eighth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and twenty-five at the Town of Stillwater aforesaid, that she was not married to him, prior to his leaving the service, but the marriage took place previous to the first of January, seventeen hundred and ninety-four. Viz: that the time above stated. (Signed with her mark) Naomi Munger

Subscribed and sworn before me the day and year first above written, and I certify that the above named Naomi Munger is unable to write her name by reason of her hands being cramped & stiff—and I further certify that the said Naomi Munger is unable in consequence of old age and general debility to attend court.
