

Pension Application for Albertson Smith

Letter dated August 29, 1932.

Reference is made to your letter requesting information in regard to Albertson Smith, a soldier of the War of the Revolution.

The data furnished herein were obtained from the papers on file in pension claim, R.9683, based upon the Revolutionary War service of Albertson Smith.

The date and place of his birth are not given nor are the names of his parents shown.

He applied for pension June 18, 1832, while a resident of Fallsburgh, Sullivan County, New York and alleged that he served as a private in the New York militia at Fort Montgomery in 1776 and 1777 for fifteen months, no names of officers stated, that he was sent to New Jersey under Captain Clark and in 1779 enlisted in Captain William Cummins' company of Colonel Mitchells' regiment and served one year and nine months in the Wagonmasters Department.

The claim was not allowed, as proof of his service as required by the pension law was not furnished.

On November 29, 1836, the soldier Albertson Smith was referred to as deceased (no definite date given) and his widow at this time was living, her name not shown.

One Samuel Smith in 1832 was Judge of the Court of Common Pleas of Sullivan County, New York.

It is not stated whether the soldier had children.
