

**Pension Application for James Stout**

James Stout, being duly sworn says that he served in the Revolutionary War, the he enlisted as a soldier in the company commanded by Captain Seward, Colonel Crane's Regiment of Artillery, Massachusetts line, about the latter end of the year 1776, at Fort Montgomery in the State of New York for during the war, that he continued to serve as aforesaid in the same regiment until the end of the war when he received an honorable discharge, and the Badges of Merrit (Merit) for six years faithfull service, at West Point in the State of New York, in the year 1783, which discharge he has lost.

And this deponent further says that by reason of his reduced circumstances he needs the assistance of his country for support and that he received no pension at present from the United States. He resides in said county. (Signed) James Stout
