Pension Application for Samuel J. TenBroeck

W.18118 (Widow: Christina Tenbronk) They married April 16, 1785. Samuel died April 25, 1830. They had 3 sons, all of which were deceased at the time of the deposition, July 11, 1843. Wessel, Jeremiah, William.

Letter in folder dated March 23, 1925, written in response to an inquiry.

I have to advise you that from the papers in the Revolutionary War pension claim, W.18118, it appears that Samuel J. TenBroeck was commissioned Ensign October 20, 1775, in District of the Manor of Livingston, Albany County, New York, and served nine months in Captain Peter Sharp's Company, Colonel Peter R. Livingston's New York Regiment.

He was commissioned Lieutenant in 1776 and served nine months in Captain Petrus VanGaasbeck's Company, Colonel Peter R. Livingston's New York Regiment.

He married April 16, 1785, Christina, the daughter of Wessel TenBroeck of Germantown, Columbia County, New York. He died April 25, 1830, in Claverack, Columbia County, New York. His widow, Christina, was allowed pension on her application executed July 11, 1843, while a resident of Claverack, New York, aged seventy-eight years.

They had the following children: Wessel, born August 27, 1787, Jeremiah, and William, all of whom were dead in 1843.

In 1849 a grandson was referred to, name not stated.

Appeared, Johannis P. Denius in behalf of his sons [?] and Philip Denius, Res'd that they each pay four Dollars.
