

Pension Application for John Peter Timett or Tintle

W.6389 (Widow: Elizabeth) Married September 17, 1783. He died March 12, 1829.
State of New Jersey
Passaic County SS

On this 22d day of September 1844 personally appeared before me the undersigned one of the Judges of the Court of Common Pleas in and for the said County aforesaid Elizabeth Timett—a resident of the town of West Milford County and State aforesaid aged seventy six years, on the 22d day of June last past who being duly sworn according to law doth on her oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefits of the provision made by the act of Congress passed July 7, 1838 and also for the benefits of the provision made by the act of Congress passed March 3d 1843. That she is the widow of John Peter Timett—who was a private soldier in the war of the revolution and was a pensioner under the act of Congress passed May 1828. (1)

She further declares that she was married to her husband the said John Pieter Timett on the 17th day of September 1783 (2) three months after my husband the said John Peter Timett was discharged from the army, by the Rev. Fanmer a High Dutch Roman Catholic Priest (who resided in Philadelphia State of Pennsylvania) at a place called Charlotteburgh in Morris County New Jersey.

That her husband the said John Peter Timett died on the 12th day of March 1829.

That she has remained a widow ever since the death of her husband her said John Peter Timett. That her name before marriage was Elizabeth Layholster.

That she has no documentary evidence in her possession of her marriage but must rely on such testimony as she may be able to procure. That the marriage did not take place previous to his leaving the army but did take place at the time above Stated. (Signed with her mark) Elizabeth Timett

1. John's declaration was not in the file and no where in the file is a mention of any military service. This name has not been found in any New York Regiments to date.
