

Pension Application for Jacobus Winne

Declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed 7th of June 1832.

State of New York

Ulster County SS

On the 29th day of December in the year one thousand eight hundred and thirty two personally appeared before Jacob Trumphour one of the Judges of the County of Ulster of the County courts of said County of Ulster Jacobus Winn a resident of the town of Saugerties in the County of Ulster aged seventy six years who being first duly sworn according to law, doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed 7th of June 1832.

That he entered the service of the United States and the following named officers and served as herein state.

That he was born in the town of Saugerties in Ulster County and State of New York in the year 1766.

That he has a record of his age in his family Bible that he lived in the town of Woodstock in said County when he entered the service that he lived since and that he now lives in said town of Saugerties.

That he volunteered always, was not s substitute nor was drafted.

That he knew no officers except those hereinafter stated.

That on or about the last of April or first of May in the year 176 he volunteered or enlisted in the militia service of the State of New York in the revolutionary war as a private soldier in the Company known by the name of Rangers commanded by Captain Elias Hsabrouch Lieutenants Peter Roggen was Moses Thomas at Kingston Ulster County marched from there to Rochester in said County continued there about two weeks then marched from there to Newburgh in Orange County and continued tree months or more then marched from thence to a place called Smith's Clove in said County of Orange continued theme three months or more as a guard to protect the grain belonging to the army, which was taken from the tories then marched from thence to Hackensack in the State of New Jersey and continued there and in its vicinity scouting for three months or more then he with the said Company returned to Newburgh aforesaid and remained there two months or more then he with the said company marched from there to the said town of Kingston and remained there two or three days then marched from thence to the western part of the County of Ulster and continued ranging that part of said County for two months or more to protect the inhabitants from the Indians and tories and was then discharged on or about the first of July 1777 after a service of the full term of thirteen & ½ months all of which he positively sears received no written discharge.

He hereby relinquishes every claim whatsoever to a pension or annuity except the present and declares that his name is not on the pension roll of any agency of any state. (Signed with his mark) Jacobus Winne
